



Attend the 2016 AEU Lay Leadership Summer School!

Making a Difference for Your Ethical Community

here may be no decision more important for the health and direction of the Baltimore Ethical Society (BES) than for a member to decide



to run for a position on the Board. It's the Board that makes the decisions that can impact the Society for years. Each member of the Board takes that responsibility very seriously. The committee that helps find members willing to serve on the Board is the Nominating Committee (NC).

The NC is the most important committee, in my opinion. It's this committee that will help create our Board for 2016-2017. It's charged to find those leaders who will serve on the Board, those who will set the direction for BES and guide our Society into the future. This committee seeks members who are trustworthy and dependable, and who will commit to serve our community for the duration of the term. But mostly, this committee wants to find those who indeed desire in their heart the best for BES, Ethical Culture and our membership.

The Board positions that are up for election every year are: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer (all four positions being a one-year term), and three of the six Members-At-Large positions (which are two-year terms).

Members of the NC for 2016 are Wayne Laufert (Membership Committee Co-Chair), Karen S Elliott (Treasurer), Kirk Mullen (Caring Committee Chair), Joe Adams (Chair of Space Rentals and Charm City Film Club Committees), Gordon Stills, and Stephen Meskin (Financial Committee Chair). Please join me in thanking them for their efforts on this very important task. If you would like to throw your hat into the ring, or would like to know more about serving on the Board, please contact one of the members of the Nominating Committee.

Membership on NC is temporary and short-term, lasting no longer than 6 weeks and ending when names are submitted to the entire Society for our annual election. And it's you, our members, who will ultimately elect those leaders who are willing to make this commitment. The results of the election will be announced on Sunday, April 24th at our Annual Membership Meeting. Please mark it on your calendars. I encourage you all to attend this important meeting and vote. Your presence is greatly needed and wanted.

Another highly important committee is the Pledge Team (PT), formally called the Pledge Committee. The PT organizes efforts to allow members to commit their support of BES. While PT mostly focuses on financial commitments, we also encourage members to commit through the donation of their time and talent. Although it's my personal opinion that the time and talent you donate to BES are far more important than the money, it's the money that allows us to gather and meet at our Franklin Street hall, pays for the heat in winter, air conditioning during the summer, our

ndorsed by the American Ethical Union, Get Money Out – Maryland, and over 80 other organizations.

This April in Washington, D.C. we will demand that Congress take immediate action to end the corruption of big money in our politics, and ensure free and fair elections in which every American has an equal voice. It will be one of the largest civil disobedience actions in a generation.

The campaign will begin on April 2nd with a rally at the Liberty Bell in

Philadelphia, followed by a march to Washington D.C. where thousands will gather to reclaim the U.S. Capitol in a powerful, peaceful, and massive week of sit-ins that no one can ignore. Almost 2000 people, including celebrities and respected public figures, have already pledged to risk arrest between April 11-16. Together we will open the door to reforms previously considered impossible and reclaim our democracy. Join us!

"Public Health Ethics"

Prof. Kathleen Hoke

Director, Network for Public Health Law

Public health policies at the federal, state and local levels can have a tremendous impact on community and individual health, yet those policies often threaten individual autonomy or property interests. Different from medical ethics focused on individual patients, a code of public health ethics sets a framework for making decisions on policies that have a broad impact on the health of the population. Kathleen will reveal the emerging approach to such a code, looking at the issues public health professionals should consider before advocating for or implementing public health policy, including evaluating the evidence base, identifying potential burdens, seeking to minimize the harms, and enhancing the health of the disadvantaged.

Professor Kathleen Hoke is the director of the Network for Public Health Law (NPHL). She is also the Director of the Center for Tobacco Regulation at the University of Maryland Carey School of Law. The Network for Public Health Law provides technical legal assistance to national, state and local public health professionals, their attorneys, legislators, and advocates working to develop sound public policy to improve public health.

"Strategies to Reduce Food Insecurity"

Food insecurity exists when a household has insufficient access to enough nutritious food to support an active and healthy life. People who are food insecure may skip meals, reduce the size of their meals, or may go hungry. Tam Lynne Kelley of Maryland Hunger Solutions will discuss the relationship between food insecurity, poverty, and health disparities. Strategies that have been proven to reduce food insecurity will be reviewed, including specific steps that BES can take to reduce food insecurity in our community.

Tam Lynne Kelley works with Maryland Hunger Solutions, a state-wide non-profit that works to end hunger and promote

well-being. Tam Lynne has worked in social services and public health for over fifteen years. She has experience working with people experiencing homelessness, English Language Learners, and people who are HIV+. She received a B.A. in Sociology from Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. She earned a Master of Social Work with a concentration in Management and Community Organizing from the University of Maryland, Baltimore and she is a Licensed Graduate Social Worker (LGSW) in the state. In addition, she holds a Global Health Graduate Certificate from University of Maryland, Baltimore, which further fueled her passion for social justice and work that addresses the social determinants of health.

"Can We Keep Our Democracy? (Or, Can We Get it Back?)"

Vice President, Get Money Out-MD

Princeton political scientists recently demonstrated that the U.S. functions as an oligarchy. Unlimited campaign money, the corruption of our political system by the donor class, systematic voter suppression, and voter cynicism conspire to challenge what's left of our Democracy. Reform efforts are growing, and Get Money Out-MD (GMOM) may be on the verge of passing, in the Maryland legislature, a state resolution to overturn 'Citizens United' through a U.S. constitutional amendment, including a guaranteed right to vote. An unprecedented direct action for Democracy, including civil disobedience, is planned in Washington by hundreds of groups this Spring (Democracy Spring/Awakening).

Ms. Susan Ogden, V.P. of GMOM, is an activist, retired teacher, child welfare advocate, and long-time member of the Washington Ethical Society.
